Demographic Dynamics: Key Issues

- The Numbers and their Rates of growth
- **Shifts** in the **Distribution** of the numbers
 - Regionally (LDCs vs MDCs; World regions, etc)
 - Spatially (Urban vs rural)
 - By Age groups
- Diversities of experiences & demographic future of different groups



Importance of RH to post-2015 DA

- Doubling global investments in family planning and pregnancyrelated care from \$11.8B to \$24.6B would reduce:
 - Maternal deaths by more two-thirds: 356,000 to 105,000
 - Newborn deaths by more than half: 3.2M to 1.5M
 - Unintended pregnancies by more than two-thirds: 75M to 22M
 - Unsafe abortions by almost three-quarters: 20M to 5.5M
 - Deaths from unsafe abortions by more than four-fifths: 46,000 to 8,000

Key Reproductive Health Priorities

- Less Developed economies: High fertility
 - Meet the unmet need for family planning
 - Address early marriage and adolescent childbearing
 - Promote RHR through universal access to services
- Emerging economies: Low fertility countries
 - Maximize demographic dividend
- More developed economies: Below replacement
 - Identify new policy options

Key Ageing Issues for Post-2015 DA

- LDCs
 - Migration/Agriculture
 - Urbanization/Nuclear family structure
 - Traditional support systems

- MDCs
 - Social security systems
 - Healthcare
 - Social inclusion

- Expand national surveys beyond reproductive ages
- Include age-related inequities in equity measures
- Adopt full life course approach to human development
