As the Start-Up Nation we believe that a forward thinking, comprehensive and well managed ICT strategy for the UN is essential. We are encouraged that the Office of Information and Communications technology is committed to taking full advantage of the latest technological developments and working with all corners of the secretariat to leverage technology for the benefit of all. It is imperative for the ICT strategy to serve as a bridge for the different parts of the secretariat to deliver on their mandates, and not as a barrier.
