Mr. Chairman,

1. Since this is the first time for Tonga to take the floor, allow me to congratulate you on your election as Chair of the Sixth Committee and through you, we congratulate the

appointment of your Bureau members and pledge our full support to you throughout

the work of this Committee.

2. Tonga welcomes the allocation of the topic of "strengthening and promoting the

international treaty framework" to the work of this Committee, as proposed in

A/73/141. The inclusion of this topic in the work of this Committee provides the

necessary platform dedicated to the timely review and modernization of the 1946

regulations in order give effect to Article 102 of the Charter of the United Nations and

to ensure that it continues to be relevant and meet the needs of the Member States.

Mr. Chairman,

3. For a small island developing State like mine, with limited capacity, we rely heavily on

the records and resources, registered with and published on the United Nations Treaty

Series. Model instruments and treaty-making guides or handbooks provided through

this platform have proven useful in our ratification and accession efforts. As such, we

cannot emphasize enough the importance of cooperation of States with the United

Nations in the provision of and publication of treaties.

4. Additionally, Tonga supports the call of the Secretary General for a more enhanced

role of the Treaty Section of the Office of Legal Affairs in this field, in particular

supporting member States. My delegation would like to see further support and

interaction from the Treaty section, particularly through capacity building, publications

and technical assistance which are key to ensuring inclusivity, particularly for SIDS

like Tonga. My delegation was fortunate to have been part of a capacity building

seminar for this very purpose conducted by the Treaty Section.

5. To conclude, the inclusion of this topic, in this and future sessions, is vital and the

review of the Article 102 regulations of the Charter are necessary in order to strengthen

the international treaty framework.
