Objectives

Ahead of the final scheduled round of BBNJ negotiations, the challenge of ensuring that all countries are able to implement the new Agreement is coming into focus. Effective financial and direct support for Capacity Building and the Transfer of Marine Technology (CBTMT) will be key to enable the widest possible participation in the new Agreement, in particular through addressing the needs of developing countries.

This workshop sets out to examine the experiences of operationalizing similar international agreements and the expectations and requirements of those seeking both to contribute to and draw upon CBTMT under in the BBNJ Agreement. It will also seek to better understand the roles and, potentially constraints, of existing funding bodies and mechanisms.

While important, the workshop will not address the funding of BBNJ institutional arrangements, which merits a separate discussion in its own right.

The workshop is open to participants from all BBNJ delegations at official level, together with a number of IGOs and NGOs. It will take the format of 2 x 2-hour virtual sessions at 0800-1000 and 1300-1500 EDT/New York time. Moderated discussions will be held with expert speakers introducing specific themes.
