This panel event will use the opportunity of International Law Week to discuss three different ways in which international law is being used or considered in response to current global environmental challenges:

Ambassador Rena Lee will speak about how the current BBNJ negotiations can address the loss of biodiversity and over-use of natural resources in the maritime environment.

Professor Charles Jalloh will speak to the topic: "Ecocide: A Name without a Crime or a Crime without a Name?"

Dr Penelope Ridings will review the various advantages and disadvantages of seeking an advisory opinion from the International Court of Justice on climate change, with an emphasis on whether it can assist in driving the ambition of States to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.
