Esther Mujawayo-Keiner

Mrs. Mujawayo-Keiner is a sociologist and psychotherapist. She survived the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda, but lost most of her immediate family, including her parents, many of her siblings and her husband. Mrs. Mujawayo-Keiner is the author of several books and co-founder of the Association of Widows of April's Genocide (AVEGA) that was created in 1994 to help reintegrate genocide widows back into society.

Father Uwineza is a Jesuit priest and a survivor of the 1994 Genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda. He is a doctoral candidate in systematic theology at Boston College. Father Uwineza has published articles internationally focusing on memory, justice and reconciliation, church, human rights and human development in the context of post-genocide Rwanda.
