### 1. Objectives

- Update GPWG participants on recent developments, including on assistance and country-specific activities;
- Participate in regional break-out sessions;
- Obtain feedback from Global Partnership partners on the presentation regarding match-making on assistance delivered by a 1540 Committee expert, at the 24-25 January 2012 meeting of the GPWG;
- Work directly with the more than twenty states of the GPWG and other invited participants on match-making using the consolidated list of assistance requests approved by the 1540 Committee and shared with GPWG partners;
- Discuss actions taken, trends in assistance, and lessons learned;
- Encourage GPWG participants to submit points of contact as well as any other relevant information to the 1540 Committee.

## 2. Background

At the Deauville G8 Summit, in May 2011, Heads of State and Government decided to renew the Global Partnership beyond 2012. Moreover, the G8 Global Partnership Assessment and Options for Future Programming document (Deauville, May 2011) identifies priorities for the future of the Partnership, including facilitation of the implementation of resolution 1540 (2004) and for which Global Partnership partners can consider providing assistance: "By providing equipment, expertise and training, GP partners could enhance WMD non-proliferation and counter-terrorism capacities in countries seeking to meet 1540 obligations and lacking the ability to do so, upon their request."
