

Guidelines for Major Groups on CSD-13
11-22 April 2005

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

With this information note we invite your organization to make a contribution to the **thirteenth session of the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD-13)**, which will convene from **11-22 April 2005**, and will be preceded by an **Intergovernmental Preparatory Meeting** scheduled from **28 February - 4 March 2005**. Both meetings will take place at UN Headquarters in New York.

This note contains some initial information on the agenda of the session, the milestone dates to keep in mind as you prepare your contributions to the session's work, the related regional and inter-sessional meetings organized around the agenda themes, and a list of useful contacts in the CSD Secretariat and in its partner UN bodies.

Historically, the CSD has been innovative in generating broad-based participation in sustainable development, and it will continue to experiment and adopt novel participatory mechanisms to increase the involvement of major groups in sustainable development efforts at the UN and around the world. The 2002 World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD) succeeded in integrating major groups even further into the intergovernmental process through new approaches and formats for participation, moving beyond the tradition of the multi-stakeholder dialogue to establish their presence in high-level roundtables, expert panels, and partnerships for sustainable development.

With the increasing recognition of the essential role played by major groups as key partners in the WSSD follow-up, the CSD Secretariat continues to develop new formats for stimulating more productive dialogue and inspiring collaborative efforts among governments, major groups and the UN system, building on lessons learned from past traditions and practices. At CSD-13 major groups are expected to be involved in the various activities planned throughout the official session, including a multi-stakeholder interactive discussion within the High-level Segment. We anticipate that such developments will continue to inspire new approaches to stakeholder involvement and produce fruitful outcomes in the years ahead.

Maintaining and enhancing the established participatory tradition of the CSD requires continued commitment by all parties. Without **your** involvement the sustainable development agenda will not have the same depth and breadth that other participants have come to expect. We therefore invite you to begin preparing for CSD-13. The purpose of these guidelines is to provide your organization and its constituency with the starting points of how to contribute to the outcomes of CSD-13.

We look forward to working with all of you and to facilitating your active involvement in the work ahead.

1. INTRODUCTION TO CSD-13

At its eleventh session, held in New York from 28 April - 9 May 2003, the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD) decided that its multi-year programme of work following the 2002 World Summit on Sustainable Development would be organized on the basis of two-year “Implementation Cycles” comprised of a “Review Year” and a “Policy Year” (see **Annex 1** for the full programme of work through 2017).

In each two-year cycle, a thematic cluster of issues will be addressed in an integrated manner, taking into account economic, social and environmental dimensions of sustainable development. The Commission agreed that the implementation process shall cover all issues equally, and noted that the selection of some issues for a given cycle did not diminish the importance of the commitments undertaken with respect to the issues to be considered in future cycles.

In every cycle, a number of cross-cutting issues will be also addressed, such as poverty eradication, changing unsustainable patterns of production and consumption, health, education and sustainable development in a globalizing world, as outlined in the table below. Means of implementation are to be addressed in every cycle and for every relevant issue, action and commitment.

During the first two-year cycle (CSD-12 in 2004 and CSD-13 in 2005), the Commission decided to focus on issues related to water, sanitation and human settlements. These guidelines aim to provide you with a road map of the process leading up to CSD-13 and information on how to prepare for and contribute to the session.

1.1. CSD-13 THEMES, CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES AND PROCESS MILESTONES

The Commission on Sustainable Development will convene its thirteenth session (CSD-13) over a two-week period currently scheduled from **11-22 April 2005**, in New York. CSD-13 will be preceded by a one-week Intergovernmental Preparatory Meeting scheduled in New York from **28 February - 5 March 2005**.

CSD-13 will constitute the first Policy Year in the CSD’s new programme of work, during which the Commission build on the outcomes of the CSD-12 Review Year in deciding on measures to speed up the implementation process and mobilize action to overcome obstacles and constraints in implementing Agenda 21, the Programme for the Further Implementation of Agenda 21 and the Johannesburg Plan of Implementation.

2. THE CSD-13 REPORTING PROCESS

The CSD-13 policy session is based on a series of inputs (see flow of the CSD-13 organisation of work in **Annex 3**) that focus on policy options and possible actions to overcome the constraints and obstacles and meet the challenges identified by CSD-12 with regard to the thematic cluster of water, sanitation and human settlements in the context of Agenda 21, the Programme for the Further Implementation of Agenda 21 and the Johannesburg Plan of Implementation.

Each theme is covered in a Secretary-General's (SG) Report, which are limited to 8,500 words in length and are produced in the six official languages of the United Nations.

2.1. TENTATIVE LIST OF REPORTS AND SUPPLEMENTARY MATERIALS FOR CSD-12

Official documents are issued in all six languages. Waivers are required for official documents exceeding the word limit and are granted on an exceptional basis. Background papers (issued in English or in the language of submission only). A list will be posted as soon as available. 2.2. WRITTEN INPUTS FROM MAJOR GROUPS

The deadline for major groups around the world to provide inputs to the official reports for CSD-13 expired on **17 September 2004**. A call for inputs was posted on the Secretariat website in August 2004 and disseminated by e-mail; a total of *ten* submissions were received from major groups worldwide and channelled to the drafters of the three Secretary-General's Reports in the thematic areas of water, sanitation and human settlements, for analysis and use as possible inputs to the reports. The Secretariat will finalise the Secretary-General's reports in time for the Intergovernmental Preparatory Meeting scheduled from 28 February - 5 March 2005.

As per past practice, there will be nine papers entitled "*Major Groups' Priorities for Action*" that will be prepared by the CSD-13 major groups organising partners in consultation with major groups networks worldwide. The organising partners decided to provide their inputs to the "*Priorities for Action*" in a concise and action-oriented format consolidated in one document. The length of each input will be limited to 1,000 words (a waiver has been requested), with a deadline of **1 November 2004**, to enable sufficient time for translation into the official UN languages. 4. MAJOR GROUPS PARTICIPATION IN CSD-13

The CSD has traditionally provided a lively forum for non-governmental participation, including organizations representing all major groups. Major group participation has infused the CSD with new ideas, challenges and information and has thus enriched the inter-governmental debate. Major group representatives in the CSD process have participated in multi-stakeholder dialogues, developed coordinated statements by thematic NGO caucus groups, organized dozens of side events to share experiences, and successfully lobbied for particular initiatives that they felt the CSD should undertake or support.

In recent years, major groups have been increasingly accepted within the official intergovernmental process as respected partners in sustainable development, and their presence is now more integrated into the official sessions than ever before. The unique and innovative participatory traditions of the CSD have been widely acknowledged and are fully supported by the CSD. As the CSD undertakes a new era of implementation cycles, the CSD Secretariat will continue to explore new ways to enhance major groups' participation in the CSD process.

4.1. ACCREDITATION AND REGISTRATION

Non-governmental participation in the CSD is subject to the rules of participation of the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). These rules require that the non-governmental participants represent an NGO in consultative status with ECOSOC. Major group organizations that are in consultative status with ECOSOC, including those in the CSD Roster, can send representatives to CSD-13. Major group organizations who were accredited to the WSSD will be permitted to participate in CSD-13, as per ECOSOC Decision E/2004/212, and thereafter will be required to obtain consultative status with ECOSOC in order to participate in future CSD meetings. An update on the status of WSSD-accredited organizations can be found in **Annex 4**.

Accredited organizations planning to send representatives to CSD-13 should write to the NGO Section **at least** three weeks in advance of the meeting.

4.2. MAJOR GROUPS INVOLVEMENT IN OFFICIAL SESSIONS

The following “entry points” for major groups are currently being developed and discussed by the Bureau:

Intergovernmental Preparatory Meeting (28 February – 5 March 2005)

Structure and Modalities of Participation

Several entry points have been notionally allocated in the programme of the Intergovernmental Preparatory Meeting to consider the valuable contribution of the major groups; these are under consideration by the CSD Bureau and the information will be posted once a decision is made. In addition, the Chairperson may decide to invite the major groups to contribute their suggestions in the course of the discussion on policy options and possible actions.

CSD-13 (currently scheduled for 11-22 April 2005)

Structure and Modalities of Participation

Several entry points have been notionally allocated to major groups’ participation during the course of CSD-13, both during the official segment and during the High-level Segment. In addition to the entry points being currently discussed by the CSD Bureau, the Chairperson may decide to invite the major groups to contribute their suggestions in the course of the discussion on policy decisions on practical measures and options by comment on the draft text of the Consolidated Framework of Policy Options and Possible Actions.

Outcomes

Major groups’ contributions made during CSD-13 will inform the intergovernmental negotiations and could potentially influence the session’s outcomes, including the final text of the Consolidated Framework of Policy Options and Possible Actions.

4.3. MEETING WITH THE CSD-13 BUREAU AND MAJOR GROUPS

It is customary for the CSD Chair and other members of the Bureau to meet with major groups' representatives. The first meeting of this kind will be organized in conjunction with a forthcoming meeting of the CSD-13 Bureau scheduled in New York. Representatives of major groups who will be in New York at that time will be welcome to participate. Information on the exact time and venue will be disseminated through our listserv and posted on our website. At least one additional meeting will be scheduled closer to CSD-13, and as per past practice, a Co-chair will be designated to serve as a contact person for the major groups during the CSD-13 session.

4.4. MAJOR GROUP ORGANIZING PARTNERS FOR CSD-13

The preparation of multi-stakeholder participation within the CSD is itself a multi-stakeholder process. For all participatory sessions, key major group networks are invited to form a steering group, which coordinates the preparations and facilitates the engagement of stakeholders for each major group through the leadership and guidance of the organizing partners. The Division for Sustainable Development chairs the steering group and facilitates its work during the preparatory period.

The major groups organizing partners are responsible for:

- Consulting with networks to prepare written input in the form of priorities for action on water, sanitation and human settlements—including the cross-sectoral themes—that reflect their group's views on deliverables and on the mobilization of concrete and tangible actions to advance implementation.
- Consulting with networks to identify participants to serve on their delegation
- Coordinating and facilitating the participation of their delegation throughout the CSD-13 session, working in collaboration with other major group sectors' representatives present at CSD-13.

4.5. PARTNERSHIPS FAIR

The Partnerships Fair at CSD-13 will focus on partnerships working in the thematic areas of water, sanitation and human settlements.

In keeping with the policy year focus on "practical measures and options to expedite implementation of commitments," the CSD-13 Partnerships Fair will highlight lessons learned from partnerships for sustainable development.

General Structure of the CSD-13 Partnerships Fair

- "Partnerships in Practice": Interactive discussions on practical issues related to partnerships, based on the 'real' experiences of CSD registered partnerships. These sessions will focus on lessons learned from partnerships working in the thematic areas of water, sanitation and human settlements.
- Information Desks & Display: Representatives from CSD registered partnerships will have the opportunity to display and distribute information and directly interact with CSD participants.

Who Can Present at the Partnerships Fair?

Partners involved in a partnership for sustainable development registered with the CSD Secretariat will have the opportunity to request a time slot for an Information Desk & Display. Partnerships related to the thematic areas of water, sanitation and human settlements are particularly encouraged to participate.

Partners must ensure that they are accredited to the Commission on Sustainable Development (through a major group, Government or intergovernmental organization) to be able to participate in the Partnerships Fair.

All CSD participants, including representatives of Governments, UN system organizations, intergovernmental organizations and accredited major groups are welcome to attend the Partnerships Fair.

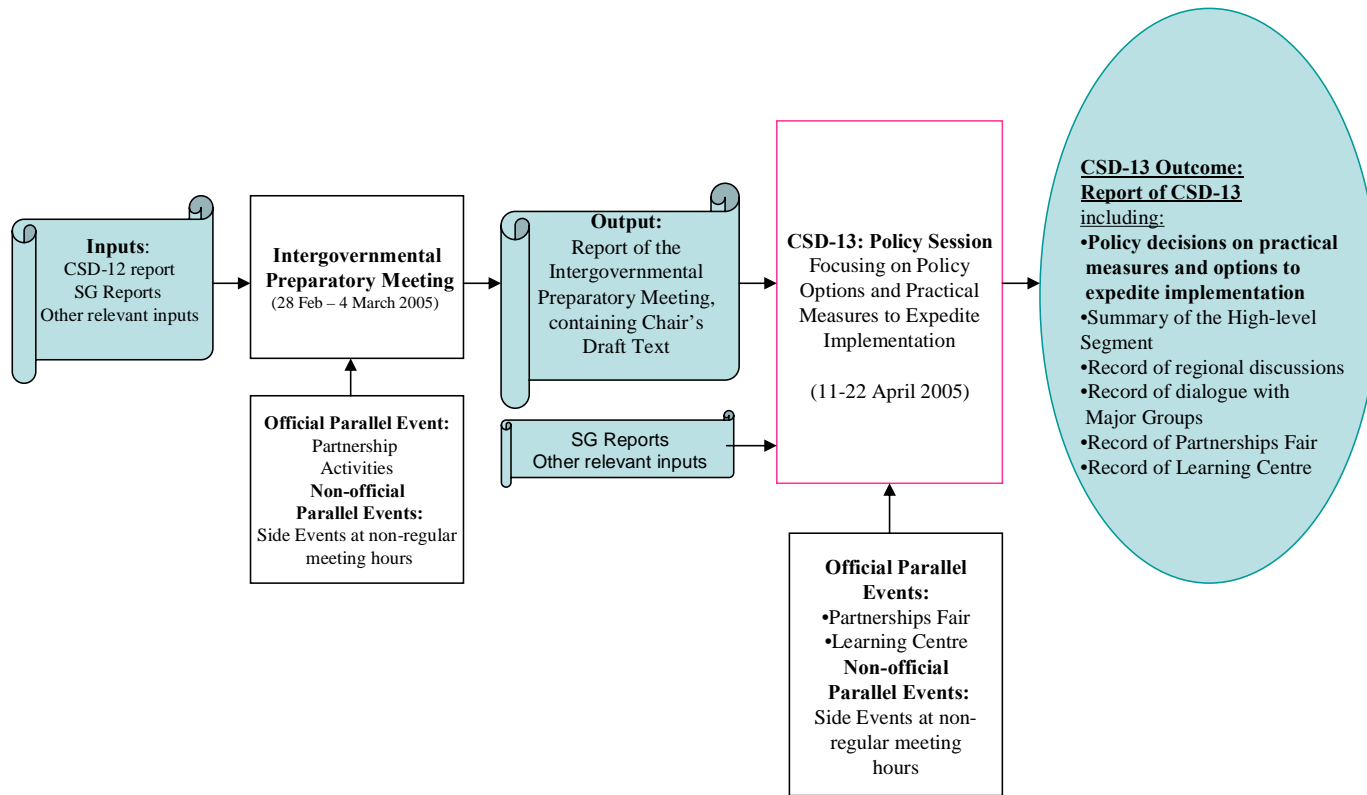

Annex 5: Update on the Status of WSSD-accredited NGOs

The Economic and Social Council with decision E/2004/212 of 6 February 2004, deliberated on the status of non-governmental organizations and other major groups accredited to the World Summit on Sustainable Development. (Note that oral decision on the participation of the NGO and other major groups to participate in the 12th and 13th sessions of the CSD is now Council decision 2004/216 of 13 February 2004).

The implications for representatives of a WSSD-accredited organization are as follows:

Short Term:

- You will be able to participate in the first two-year implementation cycle of the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD-12 in 2004 and CSD-13 in 2005).
- If you are planning to send representatives to CSD-13 you should write to the NGO Section at least three weeks in advance of the meeting, and include a list containing the names and fax numbers of the people you have identified as your representatives:

- A confirmation letter will then be sent to each representative by fax. This letter and a photo ID will need to be shown at the registration desk when your representative arrives at UN Headquarters for the CSD-13 meeting. Details on the location and schedule for the registration desk will be posted on this website when the information becomes available.

Long Term:

- WSSD-accredited NGOs and other major groups active in the post-WSSD implementation cycle are advised to apply immediately for consultative status with the Economic and Social Council, if they intend to stay engaged in the future implementation cycles of the CSD.
- The NGO Committee, the intergovernmental body that reviews and eventually grants status to applying NGOs, meets twice a year and deals with a large number of applications: early submission is strongly recommended, as the process may take one to two years. Applications received before 1 June 2005 will be reviewed in 2006 by the NGO Committee and submitted to ECOSOC for final approval.
