Nikhil Chandavarkar is Chief of Communication and Outreach, Division of Sustainable Development, United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA), with responsibility for dialoguing on sustainable development with the United Nations' various constituencies, particularly major groups, regional entities and agencies of the UN system. He regularly speaks and writes on sustainable development issues, including the green economy, climate change and related policy matters.

Nikhil is also Secretary to UN-Water, a coordination mechanism bringing together some 26 UN system agencies engaged in promoting sustainable water resources management around the globe.

He has made presentations to the Carnegie Council, on "Crafting a Fair Climate Agreement" (<http://www.policyinnovations.org/ideas/media/audio/data/000164>), to the UN Association of the US on "Amazonia: security, livelihoods and nature," to the 2008 US Carbon Finance Forum on "Is a cap-and-trade system the only viable solution?" and to the 2009 Annual Carbon Trading Summit on prospects for a new climate agreement.

Nikhil holds a PhD in economics from Georgetown University, Washington, D.C., where he was also a teaching fellow. Since joining the United Nations in 1979, he has served in Brazil, Colombia, and Paraguay and in management positions in New York.

He has advised governments in a variety of countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America, including Mongolia, Timor Leste, Morocco, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan, on human development and sustainable development policies.

His recent publications include the book *Building the Green Economy: A Guide to the Practice of Sustainable Development* (available from www.amazon.com) and an economic and environmental vulnerability study of Mongolia. He also co-authored a paper for the Club of Rome on transforming values through education for sustainable development in the 21st century. He is a fellow of the Royal Society for Arts, Commerce and Manufacture of London. Nikhil is fluent in Arabic, French, German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish.
