

Civil Society to be Represented at the High-level Event on the MDGs

16 September 2008 - Six representatives of civil society have been invited by the UN Secretary-General to speak at the High-level Event on the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). They will speak on behalf of global civil society and will address the various themes under discussion as well as offer new ideas on the achievement of the MDGs. All six are well known leaders of Non-governmental Organisations (NGOs) and are active on the MDGs.

Born in Basti Rajaram, a slum for untouchables near Jama Masjid in old Delhi, Ashok was one among seven children. Growing up as a poor Dalit, Ashok has a clear understanding of the vulnerabilities of underprivileged communities. Mr. Bharti is English-speaking.

Wada Na Todo Abhiyan is a national campaign to hold the government accountable to its promises to end poverty, social exclusion & discrimination – including the MDGs. Since 2004, the movement has mobilised more than 500,000 people.

Ndiogou Fall is President of the Executive Committee of ROPPA, the main umbrella group for peasant farmers in West Africa. ROPPA gathers organizations from 10 different countries in the region representing more than 40 millions peasants. The organization focuses on capacity building and advocacy work at the local, regional and international levels. Mr. Fall is French-speaking.

As President of ROPPA, Mr. Fall has been representing peasant's and farmer's interests at major regional and international meetings dealing with agricultural and development issues (ECOWAS, WTO, etc.) and has been particularly involved in discussions around the current food crisis.

Cardinal Rodríguez was elected on 5 June 2007 as the new Caritas Internationalis President by the Caritas Confederation members. There are Caritas organizations in 162 countries and Caritas members directly help 24 million people in 200 countries and territories. Cardinal Rodríguez is Spanish-speaking.
