Madam President,

Our country, San Marino, enjoys today economic prosperity and an enviable standard of living, but was extremely poor and with scarce economic prospects only 60 years ago. As a matter of fact, most of our people migrated to countries where they thought they could find job opportunities and thus a better life: in Europe mostly Italy and France, while overseas the preferred destinations were Argentina and the US. Migrant remittances and the return of former emigrants back home were essential in boosting the economic development and improvement of living conditions of the country.

Hence, we understand very well, as a nation, the anguish that migration creates and are very sympathetic towards people in need who seek a better life, away from their native countries, sometimes risking their lives and that of their families in desperate journeys.

Madam President,

It is the responsibility of the privileged developed countries to help these people so that their hopes are fulfilled. Happiness is the fulfillment of hope. Accepting migrants in an environment that is not ready to provide adequate education, health care, jobs and, most importantly, social integration, may lead to the creation of unwanted and desolate ghettos, and give rise to cultural and religious clashes, misunderstanding, intolerance and racism. Such conditions originate, on one side, breeding ground for vocal dissent and violent protest, on the other side, for selfishness and prejudice. It is our duty as members of the UN family, not only to respond to any such crisis, but - more importantly - to make efforts to prevent them.

Madam President,

In a world of unrelenting globalization, migration is no longer a bilateral affair, but a multilateral mega issue. Migration between countries and continents should be planned taking into account all the dimensions and variables of such flows of human beings. The countries of destination should deal with migration in a humane manner, taking into account also the needs of their own people and of their social and economic fabrics. The countries of origin, with the assistance of the international community, should ensure that their migrants do not fall victim to migrant trafficking and smuggling, and that their journey to foreign countries brings about not only an economically rewarding experience, but also personal fulfillment as human beings, capable to transfer their know-how, social and institutional knowledge to their native lands. Transparent international migration rules should be in place to prevent human rights abuse, including the illegal transfer of children and women, the usury cost of remittances, etc..

San Marino wishes to congratulate on the success of this High-Level Meeting. We strongly believe that the UN is the main instrument, with the cooperation of all its members, to face the challenge of migration, today and in the years to come.
