- Article 4: Acceleration of Equality with Men and Women
- Article 5: Sexes Roles and stereotypes.
- Article 6: Abolition of Women Exploitation.
- Article 7: Political and Public Life.
- Article 8: International Representation and Participation
- Article 9: Nationality.
- Article 10: Education
- Article 11: Employment

- Article 12: Equality in access to health Care.
Article 13: Social and Economic Benefit
Article 14: Women in Rural Area.
Article 15: Equality before the Law and Civil Matters.
Article 16: Equality before the Law – marriage and Family.

In addition, submission of reports on innovations and best practices that have positively enhanced the situation and well being of women at the National, State or Community level are welcome.

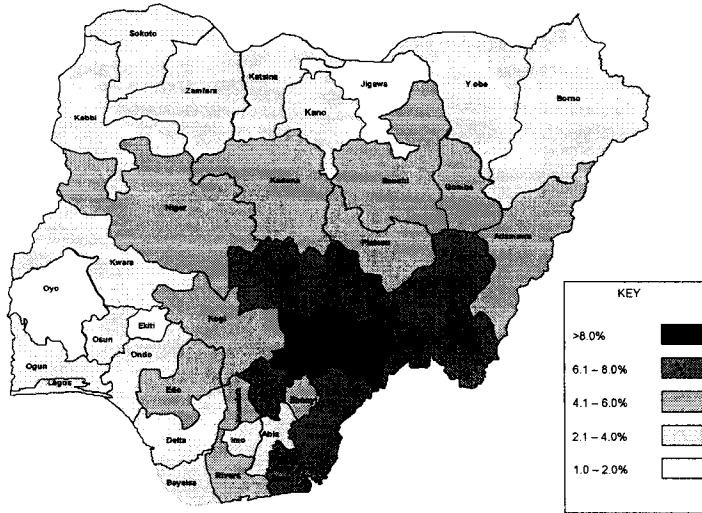

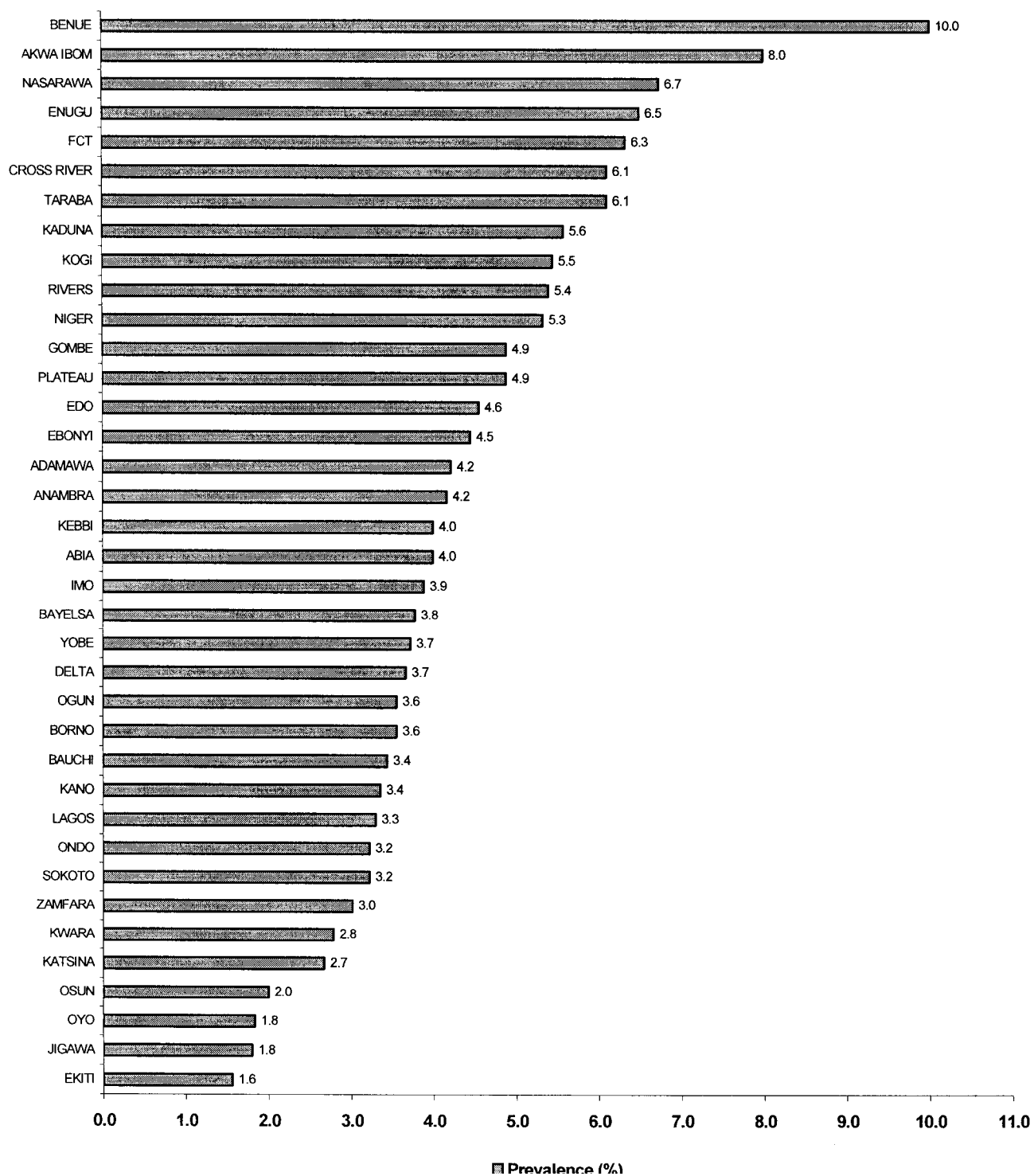
Figure 1.0 : HIV Prevalence by States in Nigeria 2005

The State HIV prevalence range from 1.6% (Ekiti state) to 10.0% (Benue state) and the median prevalence was 4.0% (Abia state).

Figure 2.0: HIV Prevalence – Country Situation (2005)



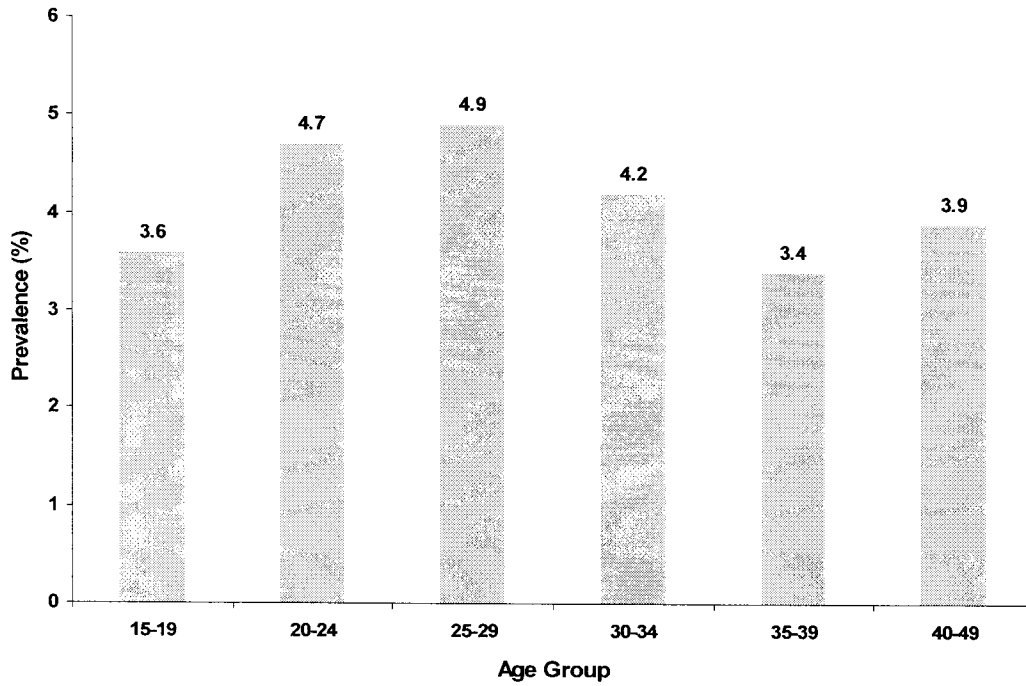
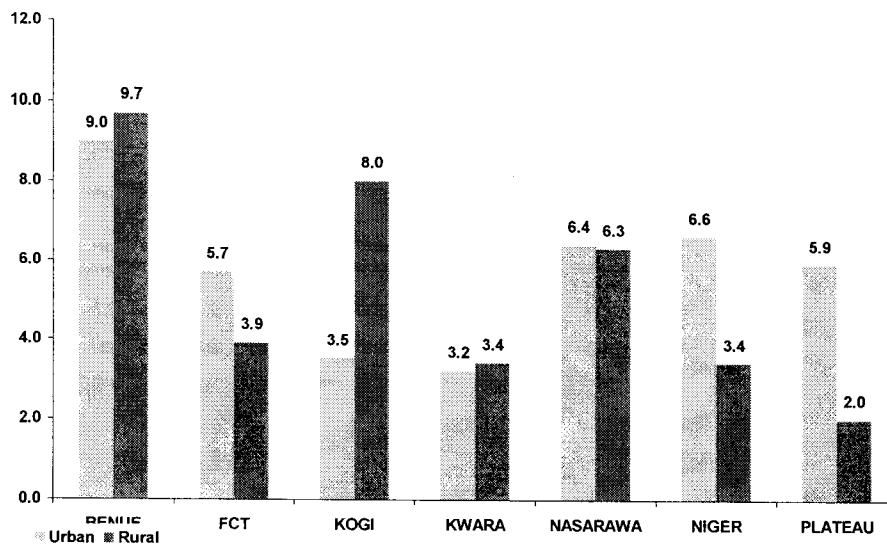


Figure 3.0: HIV Prevalence by Age Group (Years) (HSS 2005)

HIV prevalence was highest in the 25-29 age group closely followed by women aged 20-24 years.

North Central Zone (HSS 2005)

Figure 4 shows the HIV prevalence among this age group in the North Central zone. The prevalence in urban areas ranged from 3.2% (Kwara) to 9.0% (Benue) while in rural areas, it ranged from 2.0% (Plateau) to 9.7% (Benue). In three States (Benue, Kogi and Kwara) the prevalence was higher in rural sites compared to urban.

Figure 5: HIV Prevalence among women age 15-24 year by State and location, North East Zone (HSS 2005)

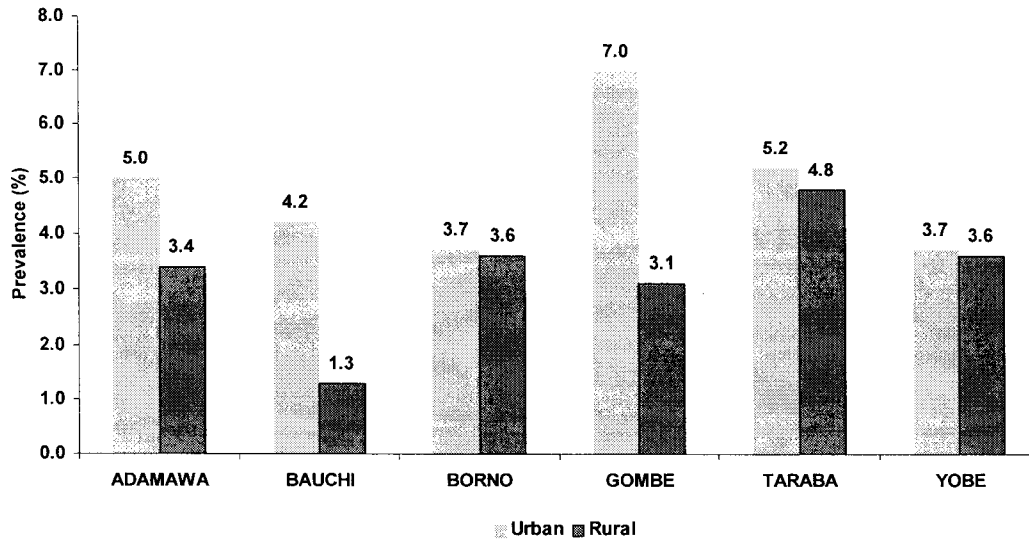
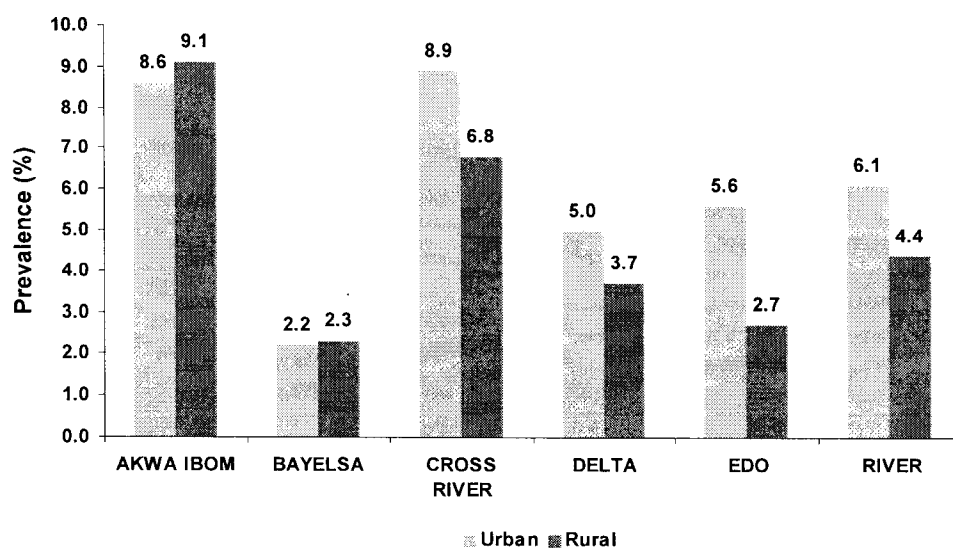


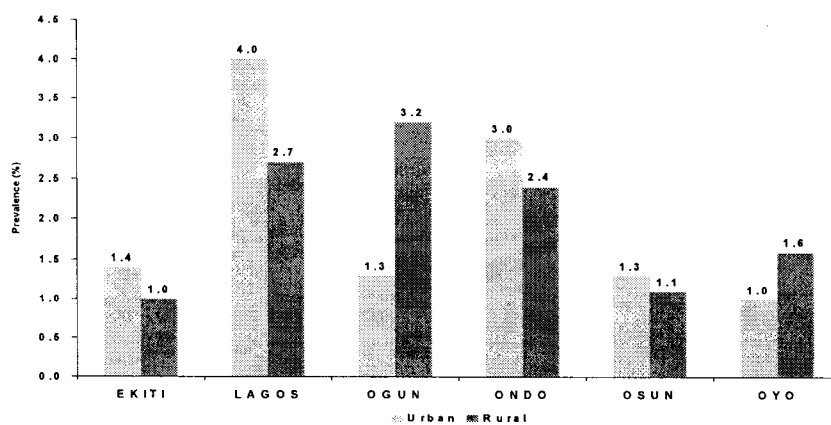
Figure 5 shows the HIV prevalence among this age group in the North East zone. HIV prevalence was consistently higher in urban compared to rural areas, while in **Figure 3.9** below, HIV Prevalence among women age 15-24 year in the South South Zone was higher in rural than urban areas especially in Akwa Ibom and Bayelsa

In the South West zone, the prevalence was higher in urban than rural areas in four States. However in Ogun and Oyo it was higher in the rural areas.

South East Zone (HSS 2005)

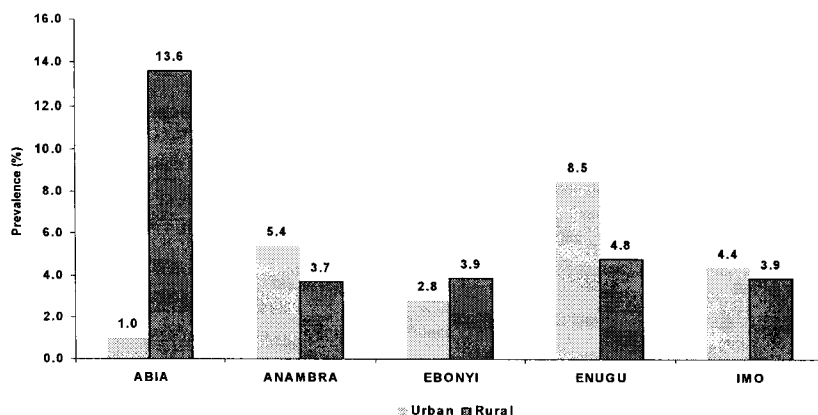


Figure 8 shows the HIV prevalence in this age group in the South East zone. In Abia and Ebonyi the rural prevalence was higher than in urban areas. In Abia the rural prevalence was more than ten times higher than the urban.
